Book Talk:

Students will present their chosen novel within the first grading period. You will need to be able to fluently communicate and elaborate about your experience with the novel. The following are some expectations to be prepared to talk about:

- ~ Did you like your novel? Why or why not?
- ~ Who is the main character and how has the main character changed since the beginning of the story?
- ~ What do you wish you could change or knew more about?
- ~ If you were the author, would you write a sequel?
- ~ Who would you cast in the movie version of this novel?
- ~ What do you think the author wants the audience to learn from the story?
- "How are you different and/or similar to the same from the main character?
- ~ How does the main character of this novel compare to your all-time favorite character?
